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

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# AbOuT 4-H

## **%** What is 4-H?

4-H is a dynamic nonformal education program primarily for youth in fourth through twelfth grade. While 4-H is cocurricular (which means clubs can meet during the school day), it is also an out-of-school program. In Louisiana, 4-H programs are administered through the LSU AgCenter and Southern University. On the national level, 4-H is administered through the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The program receives funding through federal, state, and local tax dollars. The program is also classified as a non-profit organization by the IRS. We have a National 4-H Council (in Chevy Chase, Maryland), the Louisiana 4-H Foundation and parish 4-H foundations to which people can make tax-deductible contributions.

Volunteers who serve as 4-H leaders are considered lay faculty members of the LSU AgCenter. Through the parish extension office, these volunteers have access to research and resulting curricula developed to have the greatest positive impact on youth.

4-H is America's largest nonformal educational program for youth. More than 6 million youth participate in 4-H under the guidance of 600,000 extension-trained volunteer leaders. It is estimated that nearly 36 million American adults are former 4-H members.

Every state has a team of 4-H youth development staff and subject matter specialists as part of the university's Extension Service. Work in the parishes is directed by Extension youth development professionals, who are often called 4-H agents. Volunteer leaders are instrumental in providing direct leadership and educational support to youth in local communities.

#### 4-H in Louisiana

4-H membership is available to all Louisiana boys and girls in grades four through 12. 4-H members are in every parish, numbering approximately 170,000-plus statewide. Although some may see 4-H as a rural youth organization, today's 4-H members live everywhere.

In Louisiana, about 55% live in small towns (under 10,000), or rural areas; another 15% live in towns and cities with populations of 10-50,000; nearly 30% live in suburbs or cities with more than 50,000.

#### 4-H Clubs

Since 4-H is cocurricular, most 4-H clubs meet once a month during the school day. Project groups within the school club may meet at another time during the month either in school or during out-of-school hours. Some clubs meet outside of schools. A project club is a group of 4-H members working

with an adult volunteer leader on a single project, such as clothing, horses or gardening. Some clubs are organized to include more than one project, such as a 4-H livestock club that includes members with projects in beef, sheep, swine, goats, dairy and poultry.

There are also many 4-H community clubs in Louisiana. Members of these clubs meet together for special programs. Members are enrolled in a wide variety of projects. The community club leader provides overall leadership, but other volunteers work with the members and their projects. These clubs often meet in after-school facilities or community locations.

#### **4-H Projects**

4-H members may choose from several different projects offered statewide. Projects are grouped into areas such as animal science, environmental education, energy and



machines, health/foods/fitness, child development and family life, and personal development.

4-H projects are built around three important principles:
1) subject matter knowledge and skills, 2) personal development, and 3) social interaction among people of different backgrounds, experiences, and ages.

Projects are real-life experiences that help 4-H'ers learn to make decisions. These decisions help members feel responsible for their own actions and lead to personal satisfaction. Members also develop good work habits and learn to work with others, sharing ideas and helping each other. Most project work is done in or near the home so the family can work and be together. 4-H is also about developing leadership skills and character.

#### **4-H Activities**

4-H is fun! Members not only belong to clubs but may also participate in activities such as fairs, parish contests, achievement days, club exchanges and special area and statewide events like Marsh Maneuvers, Challenge Camps and the annual 4-H University held on the LSU campus in Baton Rouge. These activities are designed to supplement club and project experiences. They offer opportunities to learn knowledge and practice skills beyond the opportunities available in the local club. They also provide a means for members to meet 4-H'ers from other clubs, communities, and parishes.

#### **4-H Outreach**

Because of its association with the land-grant university system, 4-H project curricula are content-rich in research and other useful information. The curricula complement classroom instruction by providing participants with a handson way to apply new knowledge, attitudes, and skills.

4-H school enrichment programs consist of four to six sessions that provide at least six hours of learning. The learning activities are presented by classroom teachers or community volunteers. School enrichment programs are relatively new. The current curriculum is available in character education, personal financial management, environmental education, and embryology. Additional topics will be added each year.

Although school clubs are the primary delivery system, Louisiana 4-H reaches young people in a variety of other ways as well. For example, 4-H is a part of the youth phase of the Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP). This program is designed to teach essential nutrition to members of families with limited incomes.

#### **4-H Develops Life Skills**

#### **What Are Life Skills?**

Life skills are tools we use to cope with daily circumstances, make important decisions, and enhance the quality of our lives. Life skills help people in social, academic, and career settings throughout their lives. 4-H youth development programs have a long tradition of providing individuals with the means for developing life skills. 4-H agents, volunteer leaders, and parents contribute to this tradition.

Individuals must be able to make decisions affecting their daily lives and their futures. They must be able to build mutually beneficial relationships and become productive members of society. They must be able to plan, solve problems, manage resources, and communicate to succeed in life and contribute to their communities.

The 4-H Youth Development Program enables youth to gain social skills by working with others, learning through projects, and spending leisure time with peers and adults. Youth develop interests and abilities through project work, doing community service-learning activities, and practicing leadership responsibilities. Exposure to diverse learning activities helps youth to discover lifelong interests for leisure activities as well as exposure to possible career choices.

#### **4-H International**

4-H has grown beyond the United States to nearly all parts of the world. The 4-H model for youth development has been used in more than 80 countries. Today you can find 4-H programs in Africa, Europe and Central and South America.

#### **Volunteer Leaders**

Adult volunteer leaders are the mainstay of the 4-H program. Each year over 6,000 adults volunteer their time and talents to help Louisiana 4-H members. In addition, approximately 2,000 teens serve in volunteer roles.

4-H leaders learn along with 4-H members as Extension agents and specialists keep them informed about new information and research. Not only do leaders learn more about the subject they are teaching, but they learn about teaching techniques and working with people. For this reason, 4-H is often referred to as a youth development program as well as an adult education program.



Although most volunteers lead clubs or project groups, there are other leadership roles in Louisiana 4-H. Some volunteers may assist Extension agents in recruiting members or other volunteers or organizing 4-H work in a particular geographic area. Others are resource leaders, sharing their skills with club leaders. Still, others share their talents as activity leaders for camps and special programs or committee members involved in program planning with 4-H staff.

Extension staff provide training and support for volunteers and are responsible for program direction and the educational aspects of programming. Volunteers are key to program delivery as they transmit information and share their skills in direct contact with youth.

#### The Four H's

The four H's stand for Head, Heart, Hands, and Health, representing the four-fold training and development that 4-H members receive. "Head, heart and hands" was a familiar phrase with public speakers in the early 1900s. With these three words, educators expressed the liberalizing of conventional education (the three R's) to include practical arts (the three H's).

The three H's were adopted by program organizers to reflect the educational theme of 4-H. A fourth H, for Health, was added several years later. Together the four H's symbolize the development of: the Head, to think, plan and reason; the Heart, to be concerned with the welfare of others, accept the responsibilities of citizenship and develop positive attitudes; the Hands, to be useful, helpful and skillful; and Health, to practice healthful living, enjoy life and use leisure time productively.

#### The 4-H Emblem

The national 4-H emblem is a green four-leaf clover with the letter H on each leaf. The design, attributed to O.H. Benson, an lowa school superintendent, was adopted as the national emblem in 1911. Congress has twice passed legislation since that time protecting the 4-H name and emblem. Similar to a copyright, this protection means that the 4-H name and emblem cannot be used without being authorized by the Secretary of Agriculture and national program leaders at USDA, the state director of Extension state 4-H program leaders and 4-H agents.



#### 4-H Colors

Green and white are the 4-H colors. Green is emblematic of springtime, life, and youth; white symbolizes high ideals.

#### The 4-H Motto

The 4-H motto is "To make the best better." Proposed by Carrie Harrison, a botanist with the U.S. Bureau of Plant Industry, it was adopted in 1927 when the 4-H pledge was introduced.

#### The 4-H Pledge

I pledge

My Head to clearer thinking (line 1)

My Heart to greater loyalty (line 2)

My Hands to larger service and (line3)

My Health to better living (line 4)

For my club, my community, my country, and my world.

In repeating the pledge, members raise their right hands to the side of their heads when speaking line 1; lower hands to the heart when speaking line 2; extend hands, palms upward, when speaking line 3; and stand straight when speaking lines 4 and 5.

The pledge was adopted in 1927 during the first National 4-H Club Camp in Washington, D.C. Otis Hall, state 4-H leader in Kansas, was responsible for the original wording, which remained unchanged until 1973 when the words "and my world" were added.



#### **How it began**

What is now 4-H began in 1902, when boys' and girls' agricultural clubs seemed to organize in many different places simultaneously. These early efforts were associated with rural schools or through "Farmers' Institutes" organized by agricultural colleges to bring the latest scientific information to farmers and their families. The first states to become involved were New York, Ohio, Texas, Nebraska, Illinois and Oregon. Louisiana's first 4-H Club, originally called a Corn Club, was started in 1908 at Avoyelles High School in nearby Moreauville.

In 1914 the U.S. Congress passed the Smith-Lever Act, formally establishing extension work on a cooperative basis among the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the state land-grant colleges, and counties in each state. Funds were included for youth programs that became known as 4-H in 1924. At that time, boys' and girls' industrial clubs were redirected along the lines of 4-H in other states. Boys enrolled in projects in farm clubs, and girls enrolled in sewing, cooking and canning clubs.


After Smith-Lever funds became available to Louisiana State University in 1914, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service was given the responsibility for club work under an agreement with the Louisiana Department of Education, which incorporated 4-H programming into the school system and created the first 4-H school club.

Around the 1950s, 4-H went through several changes nationally as it expanded into urban areas. Programming became more focused on life skill development and helping

youth become contributing, productive, and self-directed members of society. Additionally, clubs became more inclusive and integrated.

Today, 4-H has an expansive reach, serving youth in rural, urban, and suburban communities. Since 1914 more than 40 million youth from the United States, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, and Guam have participated in 4-H programs. 4-H members worldwide are now tackling national and global issues, from food security to childhood obesity and food safety. From agricultural and animal sciences to rocketry, robotics, environmental protection, and computer science – 4-H programming enables youth around the world to take on the leading challenges of the 21st century.

## PARISH AWARDS AND SCHOLARSHIPS



#### **Calcasieu Parish 4-H Awards**



THIS IS THE HIGHEST HONOR AWARD CLUBS AND INDIVIDUALS CAN ACHIEVE IN CALCASIEU PARISH 4-H. PLEASE HELP ENCOURAGE YOUR MEMBERS TO PARTICIPATE. AWARDS ARE PRESENTED IN FRONT OF ALL CLUBS DURING ACHIEVMENT DAY AT THE END OF THE YEAR.

#### **High Point Awards**

A. <u>High Point Club</u> - The total number of points that each club accumulates in all qualifying contests will be tabulated. The club in each division accumulating the highest number of points will receive a High Point trophy. A second and third place recognition and a group of "Honorable Mentions" (where recognition is deserved) will also be given.

**NOTE:** Clubs who have mixed age divisions will compete in the age division that includes the largest number of 4-Hers enrolled. Clubs who have mixed age divisions must be in the same school or must have the approval of the 4-H office when organized.

B. <u>High Point Individual</u> (Boy and Girl) - One boy and one girl in each age division accumulating the highest number of points in all qualifying contests will receive a High Point trophy. Second and third place recognition (both boys and girls) and a group of "Honorable Mentions" (where recognition is deserved) will also be given. All 4-H members are eligible to compete for this award and may receive the award more than once in an age division.

#### **Outstanding Awards**

- A. Outstanding Club One or more clubs in each age division will receive an Outstanding Club award. Areas for judging outstanding clubs include 4-H activities, community service projects and community study activities. Emphasis is placed on the quality of the club's total program and not necessarily on the quantity of things done. Activities covered on the Outstanding Club application form must be from the current club year. A club may win this award as many times as they are deemed worthy of it. If no club in a given division is deemed worthy of the award, no certificate will be given in that division for that year.
- B. <u>Outstanding Individual</u> (Boy or Girl) Ten percent of the total enrollment for each club may be nominated. The leader will determine the number of boy and girl entries for the club. Areas for judging Outstanding Boy or Girl include 4-H project work, contest participation, community service, leadership activities, and enthusiasm for the 4-H program. Emphasis is placed on quality and not necessarily quantity of activities done, or prizes won. An individual may win this award only once in each division. A group of "Honorable Mentions" (where recognition is deserved) will also be given.

**Note:** Forms will be provided for the 4-H members to complete and return to the 4-H leader. Forms are due in the 4-H Office no later than 4:30 p.m. of the current club year due date. The 4-H staff also has the option to nominate worthy clubs or individuals not nominated by leaders/volunteers from the community.

## **State Leadership Opportunities**

Each parish is allowed to have three applicants per board. Each applicant is only allowed to *apply* for two boards but may only serve on one State Leadership Board. Youth selected to serve on a state leadership board may also serve as an Equine or Livestock Ambassador but not a Wetland Ambassador. Shooting Sports Ambassadors is considered a State Leadership Board. State Boards are open to 4-H members in the 8th - 12th grades.

Plan and implement the Junior Leadership Conference and 4-H University. Members represent Louisiana at Parish, Regional and State events.



Develop programs that provide opportunities to explore careers in fashion, textile science, apparel design, merchandising and more!



Plan and implement healthy living relating programs that provide life skills related to food, nutrition, fitness and overall health.



Serve as spokespersons for the 4-H Shooting Sports program at the parish, regional, state, and national levels.



Empower members with tools needed to explore, create, and gain experience in the fields of SET.

### **State Leadership Opportunities**

Each parish is allowed to have three applicants per board. Each applicant is only allowed to *apply* for two boards but may only serve on one State Leadership Board. Youth selected to serve on a state leadership board may also serve as an Equine or Livestock Ambassador but not a Wetland Ambassador. Shooting Sports Ambassadors is considered a State Leadership Board. State Ambassador positions are available to members in 8th - 12th grades.



This program provides an opportunity for 4-H youth in grades 9th—12th to be empowered with knowledge of the Equine industry in order to serve as strong advocates



A statewide leadership program for 4-H members that provides an opportunity to build and apply leadership and professional skills



This program inspires youth to become leaders for wetland-related issues in their community by promoting wetlands literacy.

### **4-H University**

Each year 4-H members who are 8th-12th grade are eligible to attend 4-H University on the campus of LSU and A&M College in Baton Rouge to demonstrate their skills in more than 30 competitive events, workshops, and educational sessions. It is a culmination of a 4-H member's year of hard work and dedication. Through competing, youth demonstrate life skills in teamwork, decision making, problem solving, resiliency, and many more. Each competitive event allots youth an opportunity for personal growth, skill mastery, and other life skills vital to functioning members of society. #### **About the Livestock Project**

The 4-H Livestock project allows youth to learn leadership, citizenship, and life skills through hands-on learning opportunities. A child raises an animal while learning about the science and responsibility that goes into the care of that species. They then get to show off that animal at the parish, district, and state livestock show with their peers. They have the chance to win prizes and scholarships while learning teamwork with their friends and mentors from around the parish. Participants gain independent responsibility, knowledge of production agriculture, and science through their projects. Youth can participate in the following project areas: Beef Cattle, Miniature Cattle, Dairy Cattle, Goat, Chickens, Rabbit, Sheep, and Swine. For more information on how you can help a child become involved with a livestock project please contact the 4-H office. Your agents would be happy to help the kids decide a livestock project that fits their families needs.

In order to exhibit a livestock project in LSU AgCenter livestock shows a 4-H member must validate their project. This means to show they have possession of the animal for a certain period of time. Showing possession looks different for each species and if any exhibitor and their family has any question you as a leader can assist them. Or if you are unsure of the answer yourself you may reach out to an agent to learn more. The deadlines and guidelines are below.

#### Validation/Possession Deadlines:

Steers: August 14, 2023

Must be validated by exhibitor and submitted to Parish LSU AgCenter Office on or by <u>August 14th</u>, 2023 @4:30pm.

Beef & Dairy Commercial Heifers, Market lambs & Commercial Ewes, Market Goats & Commercial Does: November 6, 2023

Must be validated by exhibitor and submitted to Parish LSU AgCenter Office on or by November 6th, 2023 @ 4:30pm.

Market & Commercial Hogs: December 4, 2023

Must be validated by exhibitor and submitted to Parish LSU AgCenter Office on or by December 4th, 2023 @ 4:30pm.

#### **Exhibitor Responsibility:**

- a. Animals must be in continuous possession of exhibitor from time of validation until the LSU AgCenter State Livestock Show. See rules in 2023-24 LSU AgCenter State Livestock Show catalog or consult the livestock show manager for specific possession rules.
- b. Exhibitors should request validation kits from agents and FFA advisors as per parish guidelines. Each parish LSU AgCenter 4-H office will supply validation kits to exhibitors upon request.
- c. Validation will consist of:
  - i. Ear tagging animal.
  - ii. Collecting hair sample and/or DNA sample; hair sample should be placed in a properly identified validation envelope for each animal validated. Validation envelope must be returned to local LSU AgCenter office with validation fee by specified deadline.
  - iii. Exhibiter entering animal information into the 4-H Online system on or before deadline.



The responsibility of entering animal info into 4-H online, ear tagging animals, and collecting DNA and/or hair samples will be that of the exhibitor and/or parent. Agents/Ag Teachers <u>MAY</u> be present and can assist.

- 4. Animals previously tagged for the 2023 Louisiana State Fair may utilize the State Fair TAG to complete LSU AgCenter State Show validations. New DNA samples must be submitted to LSU AgCenter for all animals previously validated for the State Fair
- 5. Animals must be validated in either the exhibitors name or in the family name (Family consist of parents, legal guardians, brothers, and sisters.). When official entry forms are turned in at the parish level animals validated in family name must be entered in the name of the exhibitor that will show the animal at the District and State Livestock Shows.

#### 4-H Summer Camp (4th—6th grades)

Our summer camp program continues to be a beloved tradition for the 4-H youth in Louisiana. As we embark on our 100th year of camping, we continue to offer every camper the opportunity to gain new experiences and independence, learn to appreciate the outdoors, form friendships, and have a chance to participate in educational tracks and recreational activities.

#### 4-H LOST Camp (7th and 8th grades)

Campers enjoy interactive recreational activities such as swimming, canoeing/kayaking, archery, volleyball, dancing, arts and crafts, and much more. While at 4-H LOST Camp, campers select 3 educational tracks in which they participate in fun activities each morning that are focused on that area. The tracks include videography, wetlands, outdoor adventures, SET (science, engineering, and technology), and more!

#### Marsh Maneuvers (9th—12th grades)

This program takes place over four weeks during the summer, with a new group of 4-H students participating in each four-day session. Since 1989, over 1700 students have participated in the program.

Marsh Maneuvers is an educational program of the LSU AgCenter in cooperation with the Louisiana Sea Grant College Program, Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries, and McIlhenny Co.



### Cookery

## General rules and expectations

ALL DISHES SUBMITTED MUST BE BROUGHT IN AN ICE CHEST, ON ICE this includes cookies, cakes, brownies and bento submissions

\*\*temperature checks will be conducted—all dishes must be 40°F or lower\*\*

## NO HOT DISHES ACCEPTED, NO EXCEPTION ALL DISHES MUST BE PRESENTED IN A **THROW-AWAY CONTAINER**

When choosing a recipe, please consider how well the dish will transport on ice, how well it will handle the cold temperature required, and how well it will reheat in a microwave.

- 1. ALL dishes must be prepared at home
- 2. Creativity and originality are encouraged
- 3. The use of previous winning recipes is not allowed.
- 4. Contestant may not enter 2 dishes in the same category. Example: a contestant may enter two beef dishes but cannot enter two dishes in the low calorie category.
- 5. Contestants will compete for sweepstakes in each category to represent Calcasieu Parish at the area cookery in Crowley. A sweepstakes winner may be from any age division.

**Food Safety:** After preparation, the dish must be chilled to 40° F or lower. Plastic containers, insulated cardboard boxes, etc. are not acceptable containers to transport food **(NO EXCEPTIONS)**.

Insulated pharmaceutical and floral boxes, etc. are not considered acceptable for transportation of food. Any insulated container not designed to transport food for human consumption will be disqualified.

No recipe containing raw eggs will be accepted.

## **Sugar Cookery**

**Purpose:** The purpose of this contest is to promote the use of sugar derived from sugar cane, an agricultural commodity of Louisiana.

#### Categories:

- 1. **Baked:** bread, pie, cake, cookies, etc.
- 2. **Non—baked:** candies, icebox pie, ice cream, etc. NO part of the dessert can be baked.

Items not allowed: homemade jam, jelly, preserves, etc.

- 1. Recipe MUST contain **ONE CUP** of sugar (brown, granulated, or confectioners; Louisiana sourced sugars are encouraged)
- 2. Bring one copy of a **TYPED** recipe to the contest. Contestant name, school, grade must be on the **BACK** of the recipe.
- 3. There can be **NO raw eggs** in the final product.
- 4. **Food should be exhibited in a normal sized disposable serving container, not to exceed 18" to allow adequate space for all entries.** No placemats, flower arrangements, etc. allowed. No serving utensils allowed. Non-edible items are not to be used as garnish.
- 5. CONTESTANTS SHOULD SUBMIT TWO (2) SERVINGS OF THE DISH FOR JUDGING
- 6. The recipe will be evaluated on the following:
  - Name of recipe
  - Ingredients listed in order of use in the directions
  - Includes size and weight of cans, packages, etc.
  - Clear instructions
  - Size of pan, dish state
  - Temperature and cooking time stated
  - Number of servings given
  - Dish meets division requirements.

## **Seafood Cookery**

**Purpose:** For 4-H club members to become aware of the economic value of the seafood industry to the state of Louisiana, to understand current research-based dietary information and to use recommended buying, storing and cooking principles.

#### Categories:

- 1. Oyster
- 2. Crab
- 3. Shrimp
- 4. Crawfish
- 5. Fish and other seafood (LOUISIANA seafood not listed in other divisions)
- Recipe MUST use at least one (1) CUP of seafood. Seafood may be fresh, frozen, pasteurized, or dried. **CANNED SEAFOOD IS NOT ACCEPABLE.** Surimi, artificial crab made from fish CANNOT be used. **NO** raw seafood in the final dish.
- 2) Entries may contain a **SMALL** amount of a second seafood but no more than **1/2** the amount of the primary seafood. **ALL SEAFOOD USED IN THE CONTEST MUST BE LISTED ON THE ATTACHED LOUISIANA SEAFOOD LIST.**
- 3) Bring one copy of a **TYPED** recipe to the contest. Contestant name, school, grade must be on the **BACK** of the recipe.
- 4) Food should be exhibited in a normal sized disposable serving container, not to exceed 18" to allow adequate space for all entries. No placemats, flower arrangements, etc. allowed. No serving utensils allowed. Non-edible items are not to be used as garnish.

## LOUISIANA RICE COOKERY

**Purpose:** To promote the use of Louisiana cultivated rice and to promote the agricultural commodity in our state.

#### Categories:

- 1. Rice Main Dish
- 2. Rice Side Dish (rice dressing is considered a side dish)
- 3. Rice Dessert (rice pudding, etc.)
- Recipe MUST use at least one (1) CUP of COOKED white or brown rice. WILD RICE IS NOT CULTIVATED IN LOUISIANA an does not meet the requirements. Rice used in the recipe must be Louisiana Cultivated.
- 2) Dishes containing rice products such as rice cereal, rice flour, etc. must also contain cooked rice. Example: rice Krispie treats do not meet the contest requirements.
- 3) Bring one copy of a **TYPED** recipe to the contest. Contestant name, school, grade must be on the **BACK** of the recipe.
- 4) Food should be exhibited in a normal sized disposable serving container, not to exceed 18" to allow adequate space for all entries. No placemats, flower arrangements, etc. allowed. No serving utensils allowed. Non-edible items are not to be used as garnish.
- 5) CONTESTANTS SHOULD SUBMIT TWO (2) SERVINGS OF THE DISH FOR JUDGING
- 6) The recipe will be evaluated on the following:
  - · Name of recipe
  - Ingredients listed in order of use in the directions
  - Includes size and weight of cans, packages, etc.
  - Clear instructions
  - Size of pan, dish state
  - Temperature and cooking time stated
  - Number of servings given
  - Dish meets division requirements.

## **BEEF COOKERY**

**Purpose:** For 4-H Club members to have satisfactory learning experiences and acquire knowledge of nutritional value, cooking principles, versatile use and economic value of beef.

#### Categories:

- Low Calorie Main Dish: a dish less than 300 calories per serving. Calculation of calories MUST be stated on the recipe
- Quick and Easy Main Dish: dish that is ready to serve in less than one hour. Time for each step and for cooking must be stated on the recipe
- One Dish Meal: a dish that provides foods from at least three of the main food groups. Food groups used should be stated on the recipe.
- 1) Recipe MUST use at least one (1) **POUND OF GROUND BEEF.**
- 2) ALL ground beef must cooked to an internal temperature of 165°F
- 3) Bring one copy of a **TYPED** recipe to the contest. Contestant name, school, grade must be on the **BACK** of the recipe.
- 4) Food should be exhibited in a normal sized disposable serving container, not to exceed 18" to allow adequate space for all entries. No placemats, flower arrangements, etc. allowed. No serving utensils allowed. Non-edible items are not to be used as garnish.

## Personal Development (Interview Skills)



- 1. Open to all 4-H members.
- 2. Boys and girls will compete separately. Members must bring a typed resume with them to hand to the judges before judging begins. Resume must be at least ½ page for elementary students and a full page for middle and high school. Members will write the resume in regard to their 4-H career like they are interviewing for a hypothetical career of their choice. The career should be stated on the resume.
- 3. Contestants have a short interview with a judge. Contestants should be able to answer the following questions: What career you plan to follow? What kind of schooling or training is needed for this job? What kind of skills are needed? Why did you select this job? Why do you think you would be good at this job? Where could you get a job like this? General appearance, cleanliness, manners, and poise are factors for consideration in judging the contestants.

Contestants present prepared speeches on, or in favor of, cooperatives. 4-H members speak on the benefits, business model, and opportunities co-ops provide in a free market system. Farmer cooperatives handle, process, and market almost every type of agricultural commodity; furnish farm supplies; and provide credit and related financial services, including export financing. Earnings from these activities are returned to their farmer members on a patronage basis, helping improve their income from the marketplace.
- 2. A penalty will be assessed to those speeches that do not adhere to the time limit. The penalty will be 3 points for each 30 seconds or a portion thereof, above or below the limit. Time limit will be as follows:

Elementary and Junior (3-6 minutes) Senior (4-7 minutes)

## **Sports Broadcasting**

**Divisions:** Elementary (grades 4-5)

#### **Visual Arts**

- 1. Open to any Calcasieu Parish 4-Her
- 2. The three categories are Halk/Carbon/Pigment, Fiber, Scrapbooking.
- 3. Students will be allowed to enter **one** project in the category of their choice.
- 4. A one-page report on the process of their project is required for EVERY submission.
- 5. Kits and preformed molds are not considered original and are not acceptable in any category.

## **Categories**

#### 1. CHALK/CARBON/PIGMENT

Canvas, Paper, Glass

Any original artwork done with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc. on canvas, paper, or glass. This would include all painting, sketching, drawing, cartooning, original non-computer-generated graphics, printing, etc. Painted and/or glazed prelliformed ceramics and painted porcelain dolls are not eligible for the 4-H Visual Arts Invitational. Drawings and paintings should be matted or framed under glass. (Exceptions: Oil and acrylic paintings do not require glass and are not required to be matted.) Watercolor, chalk, pen & ink, computer-generated art, etc. do require

some protective covering. Gallery frames are acceptable. Canvas paintings that continue "over the edges" are acceptable without frames; however, the piece must still be prepared for hanging. Matted pieces without frames are acceptable, however the piece must be prepared for hanging There is no specific requirement for the type of mat used.

- 2. **FIBER** Any original item made of fiber. Examples are quilts, fabric collage, soft sculpture, stitchery, weaving, embroidery, cross-stitch, wearable art, hooking, braiding, duct tape artistry, string art, and baskets. **Original cross-stitched, knitted, crocheted, or quilted items belong in this Fiber class.** Machine knitted items are not appropriate for this class.
- 3. **SCRAPBOOKING** Exhibit one album or notebook, either 8 ½" x 11" or 12"x12", with a front and back cover. The album/notebook must have a minimum of 4 pages (front and back, 8 sides), in page protectors. "Embellishments" are defined as the decorations or special details and features that add to a page and make it more visually appealing. Embellishments may include, but are not limited to, ribbon, clips, special lettering, etc. Exhibitors must use a minimum of 12 embellishments and tell a compelling story with pictures, journaling, and other media.

#### **Horticulture ID**

- 1. Open to any Calcasieu Parish 4-Her
- 2. Students will judge the types of vegetables based on quality.
- 3. Students will also be asked to identify species of vegetable plants.
- 4. They should study the list of Louisiana vegetable plants that will be provided.

#### Insect ID

- 1. Open to any Calcasieu 4-Her
- Elementary will be required to bring 5 bug collection. Seniors will be required to bring a 10-bug collection. Seniors will be required to bring a 15-bug collection.
   These bugs can be any family, they just cannot be forming the same species of insects.
- 3. Students will have to identify 10-15 bugs that will be set out on a table.
- 4. A study list of bugs will be provided for the students to study.
