Mr. Bruchhaus presented Budget Revision #2 for the 2014-2015 General Fund Budget.

Budget revision #2 for the 2014-2015 General Fund includes Revenues and Other Sources of Funds of \$294,888,057, an increase of \$7,810,796, and Expenditures and Other Uses of Funds of \$299,727,697, an increase of 6,993,776, over revision #1. Budget revision #2 projects a current deficit of \$4,839,640 resulting in unreserved/undesignated fund balance of \$40,514,552 or 13.74% of projected revenues.

On motion by Mr. Dellafosse, seconded by Ms. Ballard and approved, it was recommended that Budget Revision #2 for the 2014-2015 General Fund Budget be approved as presented.

On behalf of the committee, Mr. Tarver offered the motion to approve the committee recommendation; a second was not needed. The motion carried on a vote.

Next, Mr. Bruchhaus presented the Cash Management and Investments Policy. He stated that all investment objectives should be governed by the following goals: safety of principal, liquidity, and yield. Aaron Natali requested that we review the fee structure of our investment manager. This item was for information only and did not require a motion.

The last item on the agenda was the Riverboat funds update. Mr. Bruchhaus presented the current funds with a projected ending unreserved/undesignated reserves balance of \$197,021. He also discussed the projected funds for the July 1, 2015 - June 30, 2016 year with a projected ending unreserved/undesignated reserves balance of \$2,368,271. WHEREAS, during each fiscal year between Fiscal Year 2009-10 and Fiscal Year 2011-12, the Louisiana Board of Elementary and Secondary Education adopted and the Louisiana Legislature approved a Minimum Foundation Program funding formula that provides that an annual growth adjustment of 2.75% shall automatically be applied to the state and local base per pupil amount in the event that the Resolution adopting the formula remains in effect in a subsequent fiscal year, and

WHEREAS, one of the Minimum Foundation Program funding formulas adopted by the Louisiana Board of Elementary and Secondary Education and approved by the Louisiana legislature between Fiscal Year 2009-10 and Fiscal Year 2011-12 remain in effect for Fiscal Years 2012-13 and 2013-14 by virtue of the Louisiana Legislature's failure to approve a constitutional Minimum Foundation Program funding formula for Fiscal Year 2012-13 and failed to approve a Minimum Foundation Program funding formula for Fiscal Year 2013-14, and

WHEREAS, the Calcasieu Parish School Board has been negatively impacted by there being no growth in the state and local base per pupil amount in the Minimum Foundation Program funding formula for several prior years, and

WHEREAS, the application of one of the Minimum Foundation Program funding formulas adopted by the Louisiana Board of Elementary and Secondary Education and approved by the Louisiana legislature between Fiscal Year 2009-10 and Fiscal Year 2011-12 will result in a growth of 2.75 percent in the state and local base per pupil amount in the Minimum Foundation Program funding formula for Fiscal Years 2012-13 and 2013-14, and

WHEREAS, pursuant to La. R.S. 17:81(E)(1), school boards are mandated to exercise proper vigilance in securing for their schools all funds destined for the support of said schools, and

WHEREAS, the funds comprising the annual growth adjustment are funds destined for the support of the schools in this school system, and

WHEREAS, the Calcasieu Parish School Board, its Superintendent of Schools, and its staff are in need of special counsel with experience, training, and expertise in school and constitutional law issues to seek recovery any and all funds destined for the support of the public schools in Calcasieu Parish, and

WHEREAS, through its representation of various school boards in the State of Louisiana, the law firm of Hammonds, Sills, Adkins & Guice, LLP of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, has special experience, training, and expertise in those issues of school law relevant to the proposed litigation, and

WHEREAS, through its representation of the Louisiana Association of Educators and others in constitutional litigation concerning the Minimum Foundation Formula as well as its representation of various school employees throughout the State of Louisiana, the law firm of Blackwell & Associates of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, has special experience, training, and expertise in those issues of school law relevant to the proposed litigation, and

WHEREAS, the law firm of Kean Miller LLP of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, has special experience in constitutional litigation through such past representations of the Louisiana Association of Educators in *Louisiana Association of Educators v. Edwards*, involving constitutional issues concerning the funding of the Minimum Foundation Program formula, now

THEREFORE, BE IT DULY RESOLVED, by the Calcasieu Parish School Board in regular session duly convened that it directs Hammonds, Sills, Adkins & Guice, LLP, Blackwell & Associates and Kean Miller LLP be hired for this specific purpose to immediately seek through litigation as may in special counsel's opinion be deemed necessary and appropriate the recovery the annual growth adjustment of 2.75 percent required to be applied to the state and local base per pupil amount in the Minimum Foundation Program funding formulas for Fiscal Years 2012-13 and 2013-14 as a result of the application of one of the Minimum Foundation Program funding formulas adopted by the Louisiana Board of Elementary and Secondary Education and approved by the Louisiana legislature between Fiscal Year 2009-10 and Fiscal Year 2011-12 on behalf of the Calcasieu Parish School Board.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Calcasieu Parish School Board has been duly advised that the law firm of Blackwell & Associates of Baton Rouge, Louisiana has in the past, and may, in the future, represent school employees in matters in which the Calcasieu Parish School Board is an adverse party. The Calcasieu Parish School Board recognizes

SALES TAX PROPOSITION

Shall the Calcasieu Parish School Board, Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana, under the provisions of Article 6, Section 29(B) of the Constitution of 1974 of the State of Louisiana, La. R.S. 47:338.54 and 47:338.84, and other constitutional and statutory authority supplemental thereto, for a period of ten years beginning July 1, 2015, be authorized to levy and collect, and adopt an ordinance providing for such levy and collection, a tax of one-half of one percent (½ of 1%), with collections from the tax estimated to be \$22,500,000 for one entire year, upon the sale at retail, the use, the lease or rental, the consumption and storage for use or consumption of tangible personal property and on sales of services in Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana, all presently or hereafter defined in La. We therefore ascertained that the majority of qualified electors of Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana qualified to vote under the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana voting in said election voted in favor of the sales tax proposition.

RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION PROMULGATING THE RESULTS OF A SPECIAL ELECTION HELD IN CALCASIEU PARISH, LOUISIANA ON MAY 2, 2015.

WHEREAS, on May 2, 2015, an election was held in Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana, to determine the proposition hereinafter set out;

WHEREAS, the returns of said election were canvassed by the Board according to law and notice duly given as provided by law, and the result of said election was declared to be in favor of said proposition;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Parish School Board of Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana, as follows:

SECTION 1. An election was held in Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana, on May 2, 2015, to determine the propositions hereinafter set out; that said election was duly and properly called by the Board by a resolution adopted on January 13, 2015, and recorded in the records of said Board, that notice of said election embracing all matters required by law to be contained therein was given by publication in the *Lake Charles American Press*, a newspaper published in

Lake Charles, Louisiana, and of general circulation in Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana, on February 26, March 5, March 12, and March 19, 2015; that this Board did in said resolution designate the polling places for said election and did provide for the use of voting machines in the conduct of said election; that election officials were duly selected; that each election official received the certificate of instruction of the use of the voting machines and his duties in connection therewith as required by law; that the State Custodian of Voting Machines and the Clerk of Court and Ex-Officio Parish Custodian of Voting Machines of Calcasieu Parish made available on the day of the election at the polling places designated for the conduct of said election the necessary voting machines and all necessary equipment and paraphernalia required by law in connection with the use of voting machines at elections; that the Registrar of Voters and the Clerk of Court of Calcasieu Parish furnished to the election Commissioners and Commissioners-in-Charge copies of the precinct registers for each precinct or ward entitled to vote at such polling places; that the Louisiana Secretary of State prepared and certified the ballot used in the voting machines as required by law; that the proposition voted on in said election and as it appeared in said voting machine was in due form provided by law and the resolution adopted by this Board on January 13, 2015, calling said special election; that the results of said election were written on a large sheet of paper at said polling places, which sheet of paper was signed by each of the election officials designated to conduct such election at said polling places and which sheet was thereupon posted in public view at the polling places in accordance with law; that only qualified electors under the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana voted at said election; that the officials who served at said election were duly and properly appointed; that the places of all absent election officials were properly filled in accordance with law; that before opening the polls all election officials were properly sworn in accordance with law; that the polls at the voting places were opened at 7:00 a.m. and remained open and until not later than 8:00 p.m.; that after the closing of the polls the votes for and against the proposition were properly counted and tallied and the necessary tabulation blanks, certificates and statements were made by the election officials in accordance with law and the voting machines delivered to the Clerk of Court and Ex-Officio Custodian of Voting Machines in and for Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana, and a copy of the results of said election delivered to the Clerk of the District Court of Calcasieu Parish as required by Louisiana law; that on May 5, 2015, that being the third day after said election the Clerk of Court and Ex-Officio Custodian of Voting Machines, after breaking the seals and opening the voting machines used in said election did transcript the totals for the proposition voted upon at said election; and that

all things whatsoever required by law to be done in connection with the holding of said election were properly and duly performed in manner and form as required by Part I of Chapter 2-D of Subtitle II of Title 47 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950, as amended (in particular, La. R.S. 47:338.54 and 47:338.84), and the general election laws of the State of Louisiana.

SECTION 2. In said election the following proposition was approved by a majority of the electors qualified to vote and voting in said election in Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana:

SALES TAX PROPOSITION

Shall the Calcasieu Parish School Board, Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana, under the provisions of Article 6, Section 29(B) of the Constitution of 1974 of the State of Louisiana, La. R.S. 47:338.54 and 47:338.84, and other constitutional and statutory authority supplemental thereto, for a period of ten years beginning July 1, 2015, be authorized to levy and collect, and adopt an ordinance providing for such levy and collection, a tax of one-half of one percent (1/2 of 1%), with collections from the tax estimated to be \$22,500,000 for one entire year, upon the sale at retail, the use, the lease or rental, the consumption and storage for use or consumption of tangible personal property and on sales of services in Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana, all presently or hereafter defined in La. R.S. 47:301 through La. R.S. 47:317, with the proceeds of the tax to be dedicated exclusively for supplementing the salaries and benefits of teachers and other employees of the Calcasieu Parish School Board?

SECTION 3. The results of said election shall be promulgated by publication of this resolution of promulgation one time in the *Lake Charles American Press*, a newspaper published in Lake Charles, Louisiana, the official journal of the Board and of general circulation in Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana.

SALES AND USE TAX ORDINANCE 2015

An Ordinance providing for levy and collection of a one-half of one percent (½ of 1%) sales and use tax by the Calcasieu Parish School Board, State of Louisiana, for a 10-year period beginning July 1, 2015, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 2-D of Subtitle II, Title 47 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950, as it may be amended ("Uniform Local Sales Tax Code").

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 2-D of Subtitle II, Title 47 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950, as amended ("Uniform Local Sales Tax Code"), more particularly Section 338.54 of Title 47 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950, as amended (a redesignation of La. R.S. 33:2721.6 pursuant to Act 248 of the 2011 Legislative Session), and Article VI, Section 29 of the Louisiana Constitution of 1974, and the authority granted at a special election held in Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana on May 2, 2015, the Calcasieu Parish School Board, State of Louisiana ("School Board") now levies for collection a one-half of one percent (½ of 1%) sales and use tax ("Tax") for a 10-year period beginning July 1, 2015, the proceeds of which are to be allocated, distributed, and used by the School Board as set forth in the proposition submitted at the election, a copy of which proposition is attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and made a part of this ordinance as if fully set forth herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CALCASIEU PARISH SCHOOL BOARD, STATE OF LOUISIANA, that:

SECTION 1. School Board Tax. The Tax in favor of the School Board authorized at a special election held within Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana (the "Parish"), on May 2, 2015, upon the sale at retail, the use, the lease or rental, the consumption, the distribution and storage for use or consumption, of tangible personal property, and upon the sale of services in the Parish, shall continue to be assessed, imposed, collected, paid and enforced, in the manner and subject to the terms and provisions of Uniform Local Sales Tax Code, the provisions of which are incorporated by reference herein, for the duration of the Tax as authorized by (i) the

electorate of the Parish on May 2, 2015; and (ii) Exhibit A.

Proceeds of the Tax, described in this Section shall continue to be allocated, distributed and used by the School Board in the manner and for the purposes described and provided for in Exhibit A which is the proposition approved by the electorate of the Parish on May 2, 2015.

SECTION 2. <u>Integrated Bracket Schedule Applicable to Collection</u>. The Tax described in Section 1 shall be collected on the basis of the applicable integrated bracket schedule prescribed by the Collector of Revenue, State of Louisiana, pursuant to Section 304 of Title 47 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950, as amended (R.S. 47:304). The dealers shall remit to the sales tax collector of the School Board ("Collector") and comply with the Uniform Local Sales Tax Code, particularly La. R. S. 47:337.29, the proportionate part of the sales and use taxes collected in the Parish in accordance with said integrated bracket schedule.

SECTION 3. <u>Vendor's Compensation</u>. For the purpose of compensating dealers in accounting for and remitting the Tax described in this Ordinance, each dealer shall be allowed one percent (1%) of the amount of the Tax due and accounted for and remitted to the Collector in the form of a deduction in submitting his report and/or reports and paying the amount due by the dealer, provided the amount due was not delinquent at the time of payment, and provided the amount of any credit claimed for taxes already paid to a wholesaler shall not be deducted in computing the commission allowed the dealer hereunder.

SECTION 4. Exclusions and Exemptions. The Tax imposed under this Ordinance is subject to specific provisions under La. R.S. 47:305 of the Louisiana state sales and use tax laws and La. R.S. 47:337.9 of the Uniform Local Sales Tax Code. The School Board has not adopted the optional exclusions or exemptions allowed by Louisiana state sales and use tax law and codified under R.S. 47:337.10, nor shall it adopt any exclusions or exemptions which are not allowed as an exclusion or exemption from Louisiana state sales and use tax. Included within the tax base is every transaction, whether sales, use, lease or rental, or service, with no exclusions

or exemptions except for those mandated upon political subdivisions by the Constitution or statutes of the State of Louisiana.

SECTION 5. <u>Interest.</u> The interest on the unpaid Tax provided for by La. R.S. 47:337.69 shall be at the rate of one and one-fourth percent (1-1/4%) per month.

SECTION 6. <u>Delinquency Penalty</u>. Penalty on the unpaid Tax as provided by La. R. S. 47:337.70 shall be five percent (5%) per month.

SECTION 7. Penalty for False or Fraudulent Return. Penalty as provided by La. R.S. 47:337.72 shall be fifty percent (50%) of the Tax found to be due.

SECTION 8. Negligence Penalty. The penalty provided by La. R.S. 47:337.73 shall be five percent (5%) of the Tax or deficiencies found to be due, or ten dollars (\$10.00), whichever is greater.

SECTION 9. Penalty for Insufficient Funds Check. The penalty provided in La. R.S. 47:337.74 shall be an amount equal to the greater of one percent (1%) of the check or twenty dollars (\$20.00).

SECTION 10. Attorney Fees. The Collector is authorized to employ private counsel to assist in collection of any Tax, penalties or interest due under this Ordinance, or to represent him in any proceeding under this Ordinance. If any Tax, penalties or interest due under this Ordinance are referred to an attorney at law for collection, an additional charge of attorney fees, in the amount of ten percent (10%) of the Tax, penalties and interest due, shall be paid by the tax debtor. Additional provisions applicable to attorney fees, inclusive of prevailing party and waiver of such fees, are included under La. R.S. 47:337.13.1 of the Uniform Local Sales Tax Code.

SECTION 11. Limits on Interest, Penalty and Attorney Fees. Should interest,

penalties or attorney fees herein, or the combined interest, penalties and attorney fees be declared to be in excess of limits provided by other law, including relevant jurisprudence, then the maximum interest, penalties and attorney fees allowed by such other law shall apply.

SECTION 12. <u>Collector</u>. All sales and use taxes described in this ordinance shall be collected by a "Collector" as provided by La. R.S. 47:301.(2)(b) which shall mean and include the School Board Sales and Use Tax Department, the entity presently collecting sales and use taxes on behalf of the School Board.

SECTION 13. <u>Powers of Collector</u>. The Collector is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to carry into effect the provisions of this Ordinance, to appoint deputies, assistants or agents to assist in performance of his duties, and in pursuance thereof to make and enforce such rules as he may deem necessary.

SECTION 14. <u>Disposition of Revenues</u>. All Tax, revenues, funds, assessments, monies, penalties, fees or other income which may be collected or come into the possession of the Collector under any provision or provisions of this Ordinance relating to the Tax described herein shall be promptly deposited by the Collector for the account of the School Board, provided, however, any amount which is paid under protest or which is subject to litigation may be transferred to a separate account established by the Collector with the fiscal agent pending final determination of the protest or litigation.

Out of the funds on deposit in such special funds, the Collector shall first pay all reasonable and necessary costs and expenses of administering and collecting the Tax described herein and administering the provisions of this Ordinance, as well as various administrative and enforcement procedures. Such costs and expenses shall be reported by the Collector monthly to the School Board.

In compliance with the special election authorizing levy and collection of the Tax described herein, after all reasonable and necessary costs and expenses of collecting and

administration of the Tax have been paid as provided for above, the remaining balance in such special funds shall be available for appropriation and expenditure by the School Board solely for the purposes designated in the proposition authorizing the levy of the Tax.

SECTION 15. Accounting for Funds. All funds or accounts described herein may be separate funds or accounts or may be a separate accounting with a general or "sweep" fund or account containing monies from multiple sources so long as separate accounting of such monies is maintained.

SECTION 16. Severability. If any one or more provisions of this Ordinance shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provision of this Ordinance, but this Ordinance shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal or invalid provisions had not been contained herein. Any constitutional or statutory provision enacted after the date of this Ordinance which validates or makes legal any provision of this Ordinance which would not otherwise be valid or legal, shall be deemed to apply to this Ordinance.

SECTION 17. <u>Uniform Local Sales Tax Code is Controlling</u>. If any provision of this Ordinance shall be in conflict with the provisions of the Uniform Local Sales Tax Code, the provisions of the Uniform Local Sales Tax Code shall be controlling.

SECTION 18. Effect Upon Prior Sales Tax Ordinances. With respect to the Tax, this Ordinance shall be considered as additional and supplemental to the ordinances heretofore adopted by the School Board, to provide the Tax now authorized to be levied in the Parish shall hereinafter be collected, administered and enforced in the manner provided by the Uniform Local Sales Tax Code and shall not be construed to rescind and repeal any prior resolutions or ordinances of the School Board relating to levy, allocation, distribution and use of the proceeds of the Tax.

SECTION 19. Effective Date. The levy of the Tax shall be effective on July 1,

SECTION 20. Term. The Tax shall remain in effect for ten (10) years (July 1, 2015, through June 30, 2025).

SECTION 21. <u>Publication and Recordation</u>. A copy of this Ordinance shall be duly published in the *American Press*, the official journal of the Calcasieu Parish School Board, as soon as is reasonably possible. A certified copy of this Ordinance shall be recorded in the mortgage records of Calcasieu Parish.

State of Louisiana (hereinafter called "Recreation District"), herein represented by

its Director, Norman Farr, and the CALCASIEU PARISH SCHOOL BOARD,

a political subdivision of the State of Louisiana (hereinafter called "School

Board"), herein represented by its President, Mack Dellafosse.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Article VII, Section 14(c) of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana of 1974 provides that "for a public purpose, the state and its political subdivisions...may engage in cooperative endeavors with each other...,"

WHEREAS, the School Board has approved participation in a project for improving and maintaining the football playing surface at the Sulphur High School football stadium (hereinafter referred to as the "Project");

WHEREAS, the Recreation District and the School Board wish to enter into this Agreement for the mutual benefit of the parties hereto as

authorized under LSA-R.S.33:1321 et seq. ("Local Services Law") and the Louisiana Constitution of 1974, Article VII, Section 14;

The Parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE I – PROJECT IDENTITY

This Project will be identified as "Improvements to Sulphur High School Football Playing Surface". All invoices and other correspondence submitted in connection with the Project shall be identified by the project name set forth above.

ARTICLE II - PROJECT, SCOPE AND FUNDING

The Recreation District shall participate in the Project by contributing the total sum of \$250,000 to the School Board, which will be used by the School Board solely for the Project. The balance of the project costs shall be borne by the School Board. The School Board shall utilize the funds provided by the Recreation District and the School Board, under this Cooperative Agreement, to complete improvements and ongoing maintenance as described in Appendix A, attached hereto and made a part hereof. Under no circumstances shall the Recreation District have any obligation to the School Board or to any third person, association, partnership or corporation for any additional sum or contribution. In addition to other benefits to be received by the Recreation District by undertaking this Project, the Recreation District shall be entitled to receive up to 5,000 cubic yards of waste top soil removed as part of the Project

from the Sulphur High School playing area to allow for construction of the new playing surface. The School Board shall oversee all work and all work will proceed under the direction of School Board pursuant to School Board policies and procedures.

ARTICLE III - NOTICE TO PROCEED

The School Board shall proceed with the work according to the Project schedule upon receipt of a fully executed copy of the Agreement and will bill the Recreation District at that time.

ARTICLE IV - COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS

The School Board and its employees, contractors, subcontractors and agents shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws and ordinances in carrying out the provisions of this Cooperative Agreement, but nothing herein shall be deemed to create obligations or duties in favor of persons who are not parties to this agreement.

The School Board shall retain ultimate control and responsibility for the Project, and no provisions hereof shall relieve the School Board, or its contractors and subcontractors, of their duties and obligations under their contracts with respect to the Project.

ARTICLE V - PAYMENT

- A. Payment in full to the Calcasieu Parish School Board shall be made by the Recreation District upon receipt by the Recreation District of an invoice from the School Board.
- B. The School Board shall monitor the performance of activities supported by this Cooperative Agreement to ensure that time schedules are being met, projected work units by time periods are being accomplished, and other performance goals are being achieved.

<u>ARTICLE VI – FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT SYSTEM</u>

The School Board must possess or establish a system of accounting and financial controls adequate to permit the effective administration of a construction contract. This includes fiscal control and fund accounting procedures which assure proper disbursement of and accounting for Project funds provided under this Cooperative Agreement and any required School Board Project expenditures. Accounting procedures must provide for an accurate and timely recording of receipt of funds by source, of expenditures made from such funds, and of unexpended balances. Controls must be established which are adequate to ensure that expenditures charged to Project activities are for allowable purposes and that documentation is readily available to verify that such charges are accurate.

ARTICLE VII – PROCUREMENT STANDARDS AND REQUIREMENTS

The participation by the Recreation District in the Project by funding a portion of the cost thereof shall in no way be construed to make the Recreation District a party to any contracts between the School Board and its contractors and/or subcontractors.

ARTICLE VIII - INSURANCE

The School Board shall procure and maintain, for the duration of the contract, appropriate insurance coverage with a company licensed in the State of Louisiana. The Recreation District recognizes the School Board is self-insured for a portion of its risks, and agrees that the School Board's insurance/self-insurance program meets the requirements of this paragraph.

ARTICLE IX - SCHOOL BOARD REPRESENTATIVE

The Recreation District, its officers, engineers and employees shall not be required to supervise or perform any other services or activities in connection with the conduct of this Project and the School Board shall assume full responsibility therefore.

ARTICLE X - FINAL INSPECTION, MAINTENANCE AND USE

Upon completion and final acceptance of the Project including liquidation of all funds available, the School Board shall assume primary maintenance of the Project during the period of its useful life. Minor maintenance may be performed by the Recreation District with the consent of the School Board. Once the

Project has been finally accepted and the School Board has complied with the provisions of this Agreement, those persons authorized or allowed to use the property and facilities of the Recreation District shall be entitled to use the Sulphur High Football Stadium consistent with its intended purposes and with the permission of and as scheduled by the Sulphur High School principal. Priority for use shall remain with the students of Sulphur High School, Sulphur Parks and Recreation and those individuals or groups designated by the school principal as entitled to priority use. The principal has ultimate authority on scheduling.

ARTICLE XI – ASSIGNABILITY

The School Board shall not assign any interest in this Cooperative Agreement, and shall not transfer any interest in the same (whether by assignment or novation), without the prior written consent of the Recreation District.

ARTICLE XII – SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS

This Cooperative Agreement shall be binding upon the successors and assigns of the respective parties hereto.

ARTICLE XIII – AMENDMENTS

No amendment shall be effective unless it is in writing and signed by duly authorized representatives of both parties.

<u> ARTICLE XIV – REPRESENTATION</u>

The School Board, and the Recreation District represent that this agreement supersedes all proposals, oral and written, all previous contracts,

agreements, negotiations and all other communications between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof.



What is a heavy haul route?

The heavy haul route is the route that Sasol and its contractors will use to transport large modules and other equipment from a construction dock off of Sulphur Avenue to Sasol's project site. Sasol will be widening and strengthening the existing roads on the route to accommodate the modules and equipment, as well as protecting or relocating utilities, signage and traffic signals.

Where will the heavy haul route be?

Sasol is upgrading an existing dock facility off of Sulphur Avenue near the Westlake water tower, where modules and other heavy equipment for the projects will arrive via barge. The heavy haul route will run approximately 2.5 miles from the dock site, west on Sulphur Avenue, north by Guillory Street, then northwest on Houston River Road.

What will the work on the heavy haul route entail?

Sasol has completed surveying and begun relocation of some of the aboveground utilities, such as the electrical lines. In April, Sasol will begin improving portions of the existing road to increase the weight capacity. This work is commonly called the overlay work. Sulphur Avenue (west of Sampson Street) through the Old Spanish Trail intersection to the Circle K curve on Guillory will be improved.

Sasol will next relocate both underground and aboveground utilities in coordination with the associated utility companies along the route to allow for the passage of the oversized equipment. Signs, fencing and other on the route will also be relocated. The next step is to improve the drainage along the roadway, and the final step will be to increase the width capacity of the roads. New, rotating traffic signals will be installed at the Sampson Street and Sulphur Avenue intersection to allow tall modules to pass through.

What is the timeline for this work?

The overlay work, affecting Sulphur Avenue (west of Sampson Street) through the Old Spanish Trail intersection to the Circle K curve on Guillory, is expected to begin in April 2015, pendingpermit issuance from the La. Dept. of Transportation (DOTD), and will last approximately eight weeks. The other route widening work is expected to begin in summer 2015. Stay tuned to sasolnorthamerica.com for updates.

What safety measures are being put in place?

- Sasol will partner with an experienced transport contractor and employ police escorts and crossing guards for equipment and module transports.
- Sasol will notify local emergency responders prior to the setting of DOTD-approved detour routes during construction and transports.
- Sasol will share transport schedules and relative road reroutes and closures with the public through our community notification systems.
- Vehicle tracking beacons (GPS units) will be placed in the lead escort car to provide real-time transport location tracking to
 officials and emergency responders.
- During construction, the roadway will be cleaned daily to ensure safe driving conditions.

What road closures and detours are expected with the construction work?

Sasol is working to minimize impacts on the community's daily routine. Some route detours associated with roadwork can be expected.

Sulphur Avenue/Old Spanish Trail will be closed in the west-bound direction from the Sampson Street intersection to Guillory Street during the overlay work, which is expected to begin in April, and last approximately eight weeks. Many of the side streets that intersect where the road widening is taking place will also have temporary closures so that the widened road is appropriately tied into the intersecting roads. Some of the side roads will be temporarily open to local traffic only.

Any road closures will have detour routes and signage established and approved by DOTD and the city of Westlake. These detour routes will be posted throughout the city and communicated in advance. The map on the reverse outlines expected road closures.

Can I still access my property during construction if my road is closed temporarily?

Yes. Local access will be maintained to properties during construction.

Are any outages of utilities expected? Will I be notified?

As part of the road improvements, water, sewer, gas, electrical and other utilities along the route are being relocated. Sasol and its contractors will work closely with the utility companies and city of Westlake to notify residents prior to any outages.

Who is doing the work?

Sasol has contracted with Barriere Construction, a Louisiana-based construction company, to perform the heavy haul route improvements. In addition, community members can expect to see team members from Sasol, Fluor Technip Integrated (Sasol's construction management contractor), the city of Westlake, utility company representatives and subcontractors to Barriere along the route.

When is the first heavy equipment or module transport?

We expect the first transport sometime in the fall of 2015. Stay tuned to sasolnorthamerica.com for updates.



Louisiana Historical Marker Program Guidelines

La. R.S. 48:271(A) authorizes the Louisiana Department of Transportation and Development (DOTD) to erect, at suitable points selected by the Louisiana Tourism Development Commission (LTDC), bronze markers denoting and describing locations and occasions of historical interest. These markers shall conform to a standard size and design prepared by the DOTD in cooperation with the LTDC and shall be maintained by the DOTD. The language of the legend thereon shall be submitted to and approved by the Department of History of Louisiana State University. When sponsored by and furnished by authentic historical organizations, the markers may carry the sponsor's organization name along the bottom edge thereof, but otherwise shall conform in all respects to the standard design and method of erection as provided in this La. R.S. 48:271(A). The placing of the name of any living person upon these markers is expressly prohibited.

Before completing this application, please read the information below explaining the procedures and guidelines for the marker program. Please note that not all applications will necessarily be approved for a historical marker; each must meet the program criteria as outlined below. When completed, this application and any supporting documentation should be sent to Louisiana Office of Tourism, Louisiana Historical Marker Program, Attn: Lynne Coxwell, P.O. Historical Marker Criteria

The Louisiana Historical Marker program commemorates facts, persons, events, and places prominently identified with the history of the nation, state, or region. Each proposed marker script shall be reviewed by the administrator of the marker program with the Louisiana Office of Tourism (LOT) and verified and edited by the Louisiana State University (LSU) Department of History and, with the location, shall be approved by the Louisiana Tourism Development Commission (LTDC).

No marker shall be erected to commemorate a living person.

In order for an historic event to be eligible for commemoration with a marker, the event must have occurred at least fifty years ago. Likewise, a place or person must have attained its significance at least fifty years ago, although there are exceptions if the event, place, or person is of extraordinary historical significance.

Markers shall be erected in safe locations, at or close to the places being commemorated, and where they will be visible to the traveling public.

Historical markers are privately sponsored and funded by sponsors. Any individual or group may nominate a location or occasion of historical interest for historical marker commemoration.

Exceptions to any program criteria will be determined on a case-by-case basis.

Procedure for Developing and Submitting a Marker Topic and the Approval Process

- 1. Research and Write the Marker Script. The person or group wishing to sponsor the marker must do the research necessary to substantiate the facts to be included in the script of the marker. Research the topic by consulting multiple primary and secondary sources. It is often helpful to seek assistance from local and regional historical associations, local libraries, and governmental entities in researching and crafting the proposed script.
- 2. Suggest a Suitable Marker Location. The most appropriate location would be where the person made an impact, where the event took place, or at the site being commemorated. The marker preferably should be placed on public land or a highway right-of-way, so that it can be read by the largest possible number of travelers. Be sure in your application to specify the DOTD district headquarter number or district location, so that the marker can be shipped to the appropriate DOTD contact for installation. If the marker will be installed on private land, then the sponsor must receive the owner's consent and obtain all necessary permissions from local, state, and/or federal authorities.
- 3. Submit Your Application Packet to the LOT for Review. Follow the instructions provided in the application for completing it. All applications will be reviewed internally by the LOT. After reviewing a nomination, the LOT will make a determination of whether the nomination meets the marker program criteria and complies with the applicable laws pertaining to the Historical Marker program. If the nomination is considered appropriate for a historical marker, the LOT will submit to the LSU Department of History all applications that are determined to be complete, timely received, and substantially compliant. The LSU Department of History shall verify the accuracy of the sponsor's proposed script and, if necessary, propose revisions or edits. LSU shall also make a recommendation on whether the nominated location or occasion of historical interest meets the requirements of the Historical Marker program. Pending possible further revisions to the script (see step 4), the LOT will formally present the marker nominations to the LTDC for approval at its quarterly meeting in August.

- 4. Work with the LOT in Revising or Refining the Marker Text. Before submitting a nominated marker to the LTDC for approval, the LOT and the LSU Department of History will review the text. The script must not be over the number of lines and the number of spaces per line specified for the four letter sizes that are offered. Any major questions about the text that arise will be discussed with the sponsor, including further documentation, if necessary, to support the marker script. If changes to the text are warranted, the LOT's administrator will work closely with the sponsor—or the sponsor's author—to produce a mutually agreed upon script, which the sponsor must approve. The sponsor shall be responsible for all script content, any mistakes and claims made on the nominated marker.
- 5. Await the Final Decision of the Louisiana Tourism Development Commission. The commission has final authority for the nominations of all historic markers. The August meeting is open to the public, and sponsors may attend.
- 6. Pay for the Manufacture of the Marker. The LOT will notify the designated vendor that casts the marker and provide it with the final commission-approved script. Markers typically ship within 6 weeks of the order being placed. The vendor will bill (see cost of markers below) the sponsor directly upon shipment of the marker either to the appropriate DOTD district headquarters for installation, if it is placed on a state highway right-of-way or to the sponsor, if the marker is on private land or non-highway right-of-way public land.
- 7. Hold an Unveiling Ceremony. The sponsor is responsible for making any installation arrangements either with the DOTD or arranging and costs involved for unveiling or dedication ceremonies of installed markers. NOTE: The process for ordering and manufacturing markers is determined by a number of variable factors including manufacturing and shipping delays arising with the vendor and the work load of the DOTD; thus, the LOT cannot be held responsible for meeting local deadlines for any planned dedication event.
- **8. Other Requirements.** The LOT requests that the sponsor submit to LOT a picture of the installed historic marker to be kept with LOT's records.

Criteria for Marker Placement

To ensure that historical markers are accessible to and can most effectively educate the traveling public, the LTDC assumes the responsibility of approving the site for a new marker. The final location of the marker is based on the following criteria:

Safety. To the extent that travelers will need to pull off the road to read the marker, and then reenter the highway; they must be able to do so conveniently and safely. Hence, markers must be placed so that they do not block drivers' lines of sight when making turns or create traffic hazards when travelers stop to read the marker.

Visibility. The marker should be placed in a safe but relatively high-traffic area, so that it can be read by the largest possible number of travelers. For those markers placed along roadways, given the choice between a secondary road and a primary road, the marker will be placed on a primary road. Markers are not permitted on interstate or other limited access highways, except in rest areas.

Location. Ideally, the marker should be placed as close as possible to the site it commemorates. Sometimes, however, because of traffic conditions, the remoteness of the site, or other reasons, the marker must be placed some distance away.

Placement on private property. Historical markers are usually placed in DOTD rights-of-way or on public property. Under special circumstances they may be placed on private property (usually because of highway conditions) if the owner gives the sponsor permission to erect a historical marker on the private property.


